The Lakeside Historical Society is faced with a very important decision to make. Each of you and your thoughts on the matter are valuable and are needed. For four years we have spent thousands of donated hours, materials and money in restoring the Olde Community Church.

On July 10, 1990 we were offered the opportunity to purchase the property. At our Hometown Reunion in Oct. 1989 a questionnaire was given to each person attending with the following questions.

1. Would you like to see the olde church owned by the Lakeside Historical Society?
2. If the purchase is possible, would you be willing to help toward money makers?
3. Would you be willing to serve on a committee to delve into the advisability of purchase?

There were 70 returned with all positive responses on question #1: 54 positive responses to question #2 and 18 responding that they were willing to serve on a committee to delve into the advisability of purchase.

The subject was discussed at our regular meeting July 23 and an invitation was made to anyone willing to sit on a committee to further study the possibility to purchase or any other alternatives to let our President know.

August 8 a group of those who had expressed a desire to further study the subject (either on the questionnaire or verbally) met at our Historical Store. The only action taken was to accept the generous offer of Life Member, Fred Einer, to obtain and pay for an appraisal of the property.

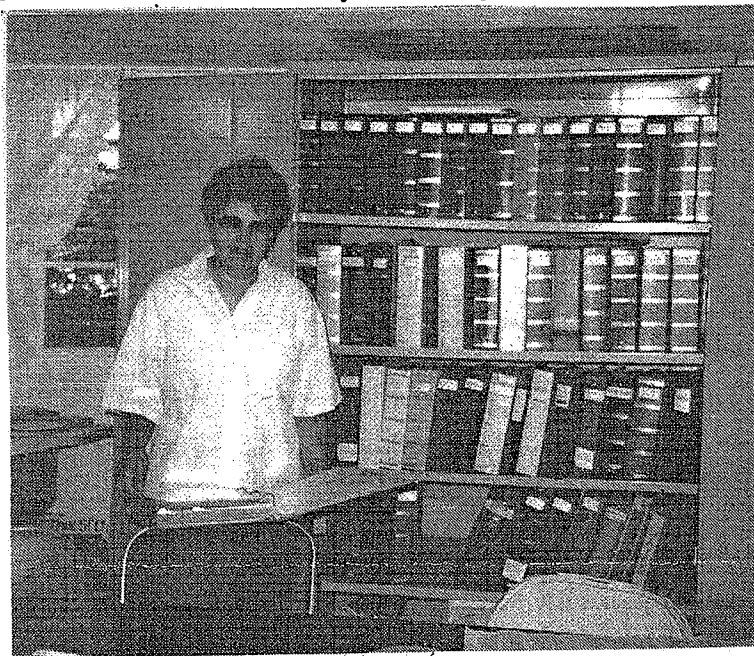

The Golden Arches of McDonalds should open sometime this fall in Lakeside. Locating in the 9500 block of Winter Gardens Blvd.

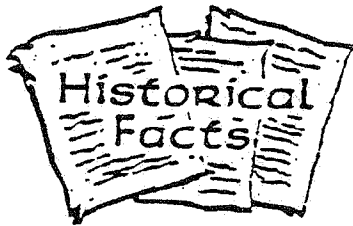

Emily Mallory Deceased

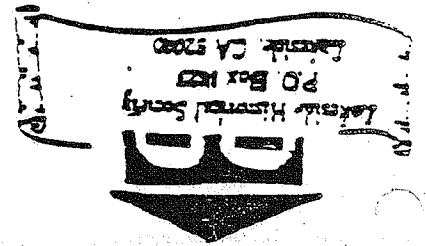
