Lakeside has first historical landmark

The Olde Community Church, located at Parkside and Maine Street, was named Lakeside's first historical landmark by the San Diego County Board of Supervisors and hopefully, will not be the last.

The decision was announced at the Lakeside Historical Society's monthly meeting recently. The Historical Society has worked to restore the church since leasing the property from the Presbyterian Church in 1986.

Built in 1895, the Olde Community Church (known as the Lakeside Community Presbyterian Church in those days) is the second oldest building in the Lakeside. The Castle House, a privately owned residence, is the oldest.

Edna Kouns, Lakeside Historical Society president, said it took three years to get the church recognized as a landmark. After much paperwork, research, hearings and waiting, the application was approved by the San Diego County Historic Site Board, the San Diego County Planning Commission and the San Diego Board of Supervisors.

"The Lakeside Historical Society would like to thank the many businesses in Lakeside for their help and the hundreds of individuals who have contributed time, money and materials for the restoration," said Kouns.

Most of the renovations are completed, but Kouns said there is still some work to be done. The church

grounds need to be landscaped, the bell tower needs a new roof and the building needs a coat of paint.

"We are proud of our accomplishments to date, but are so anxious to complete the restoration. We welcome any help we can get," Kouns said.

"The Olde Church was well overdue to be named a San Diego County landmark. We are very excited about it," said Shirley Anderson, a member of the Historical Society.

The Historical Society is now working to have the church named a state landmark and hopefully a national landmark some day soon. For information about the society and the church, please call 561-1886.

*Arnold Bongiani is still having heart trouble.

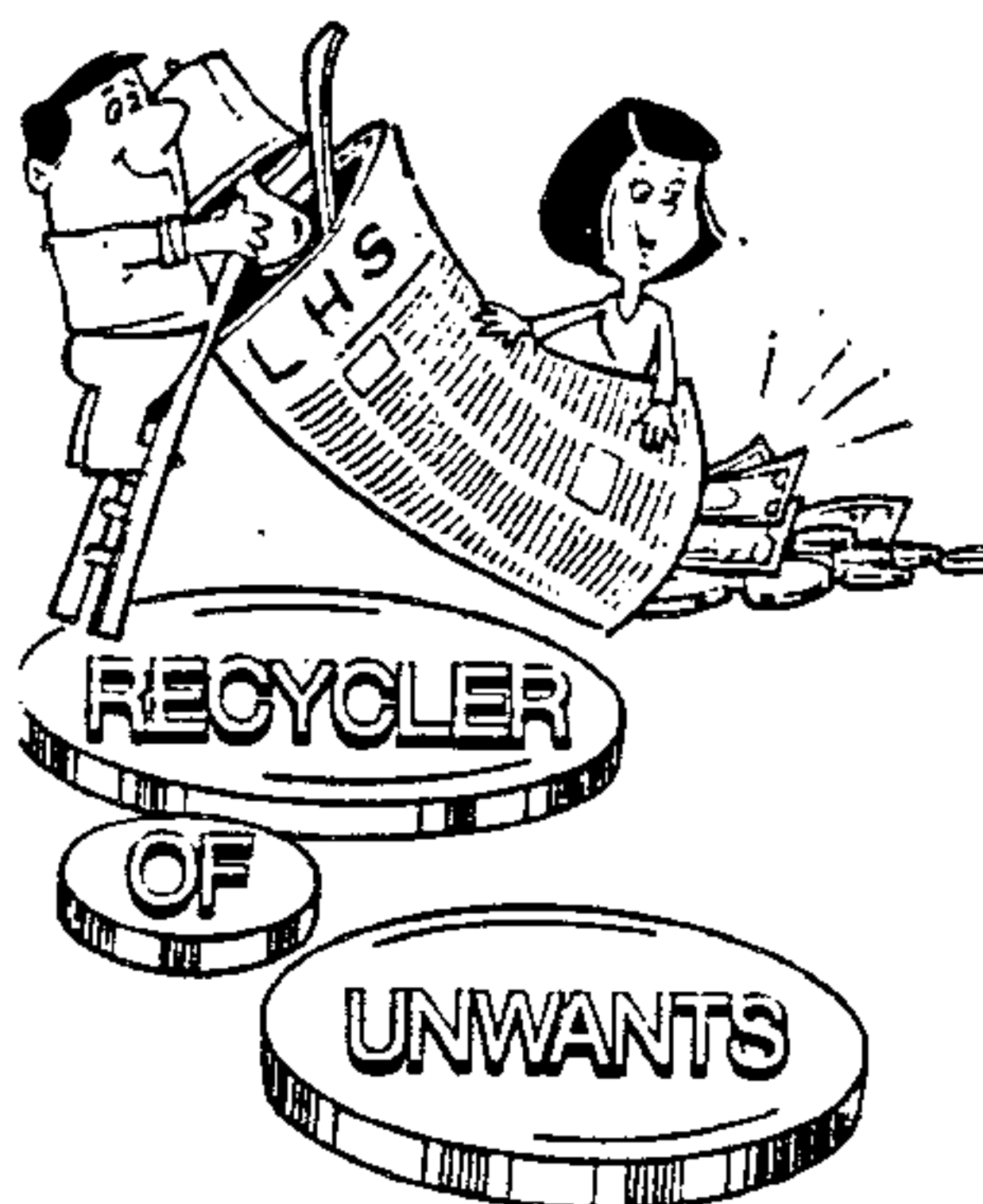
*Ray and Marlene Wilson are taking turns traveling to Grossmont Hospital...Both are glad to be home and are recuperating.

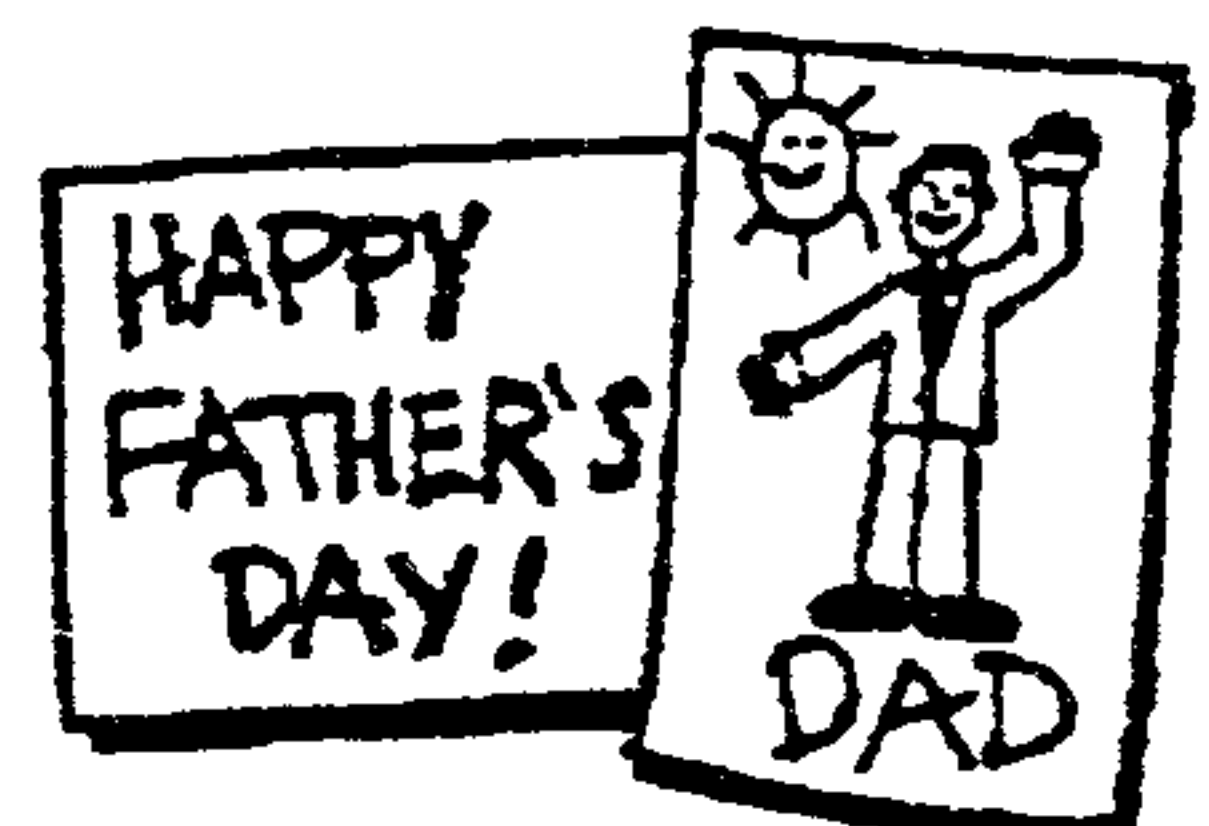

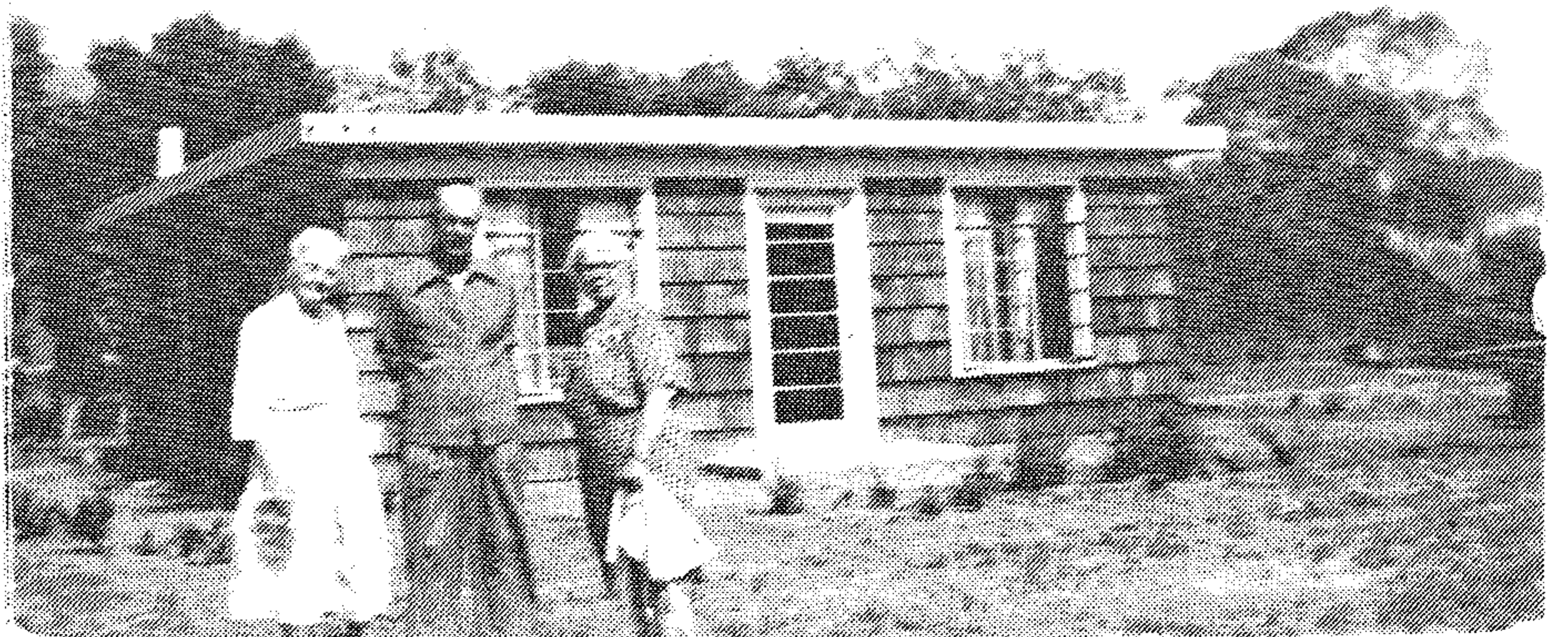

PIONEER PEOPLE:

Cowpokes, farmers and just plain relatives gathered at the Rainbow Palms Ranch in Lakeside to help celebrate Leonard Philbrook's 75th birthday on March 7. His Grandson, Gene Anderson and wife Audra's historic ranch was the perfect setting for the old fashioned picnic.

In keeping with the good old days party theme, guests wore bib overalls and western costumes, although some admitted that they dressed like that every day.

Juanita Philbrook planned the event complete with costume judging and pig calling competition. Harry Buckel from the old Rocky Home Dairy amazed everyone with his yodeling capabilities. Leonard entertained guests with his accordian and harmonica.

Philbrook was born and raised in Lakeside. His folks were pioneers. Back in those days Lakeside had a population of about 700 people. Members from the Historical Society and other old timers were enjoying swapping stories about Philbrook.

Life long friends, Earnie Ames and Mickey Campbell told of going to elementary school together in Lakeside...later they went to Grossmont High School. Harold Wolin was a Philbrook neighbor. He remembers Leonard's dad had a collection of old farm implements and antiques even back in those days. Harold's wife, Ruth, formerly wrote the Descanso news column for East County Weekly.

Philbrook is a bee keeper and jars his own honey. Charlie Foster remembered when they were younguns Leonard talked him into going to a hollowed out tree to get wild honey. "Leonard brought his net, gloves and smoker...We started chopping at the tree...Those bees about ate us up." They never did get the honey. Fritz Hartung who was born in El Monte Valley mentioned that Leonard was like his dad. "When he came to visit he would bring a watermelon, or olives, honey or walnuts...always bring something."

When asked about his memories, Mr.Philbrook said he "mostly raised hell." He lived north of the San Diego River and was born in a little house on Willow Road that still stands. "The atmosphere was so quiet and clear we could hear the bell of the train coming into Lakeside." On the ranch he plowed the fields with a team of horses. The riverbottom was covered with cottonwood and willows. He would cut down trees and haul the wood back to the house with a wagon being pulled by the team. 90% of the cooking and all heating was done with an old wood stove...In 1968 Philbrook bought a ranch on Highway 67 (corner of Willow Rd.) "67 was just a little dirt road then" he said...He ran a fruit and vegetable stand there for many years. "I done whatever I could make a dollar at," he said. That included carpentry, farming and in the 1940's working at Rhor Air Craft...In 1948 he married Juanita-she helped him raise his two children, Leona and Lenny.

Wyatt Allen said he was practically raised by Leonard. "He taught us how to work and bought our school clothes and kept us out of trouble." Betty Ward remembered that when her husband was in a wheelchair Leonard would bring over a truck load of boys to plow or pull weeds or do whatever needed to be done. "One of the best people I've ever met...If we only had a few more like him."

Leonard and Juanita now live on the 80 acre Echo Dell Ranch in Descanso where they still do some farming.

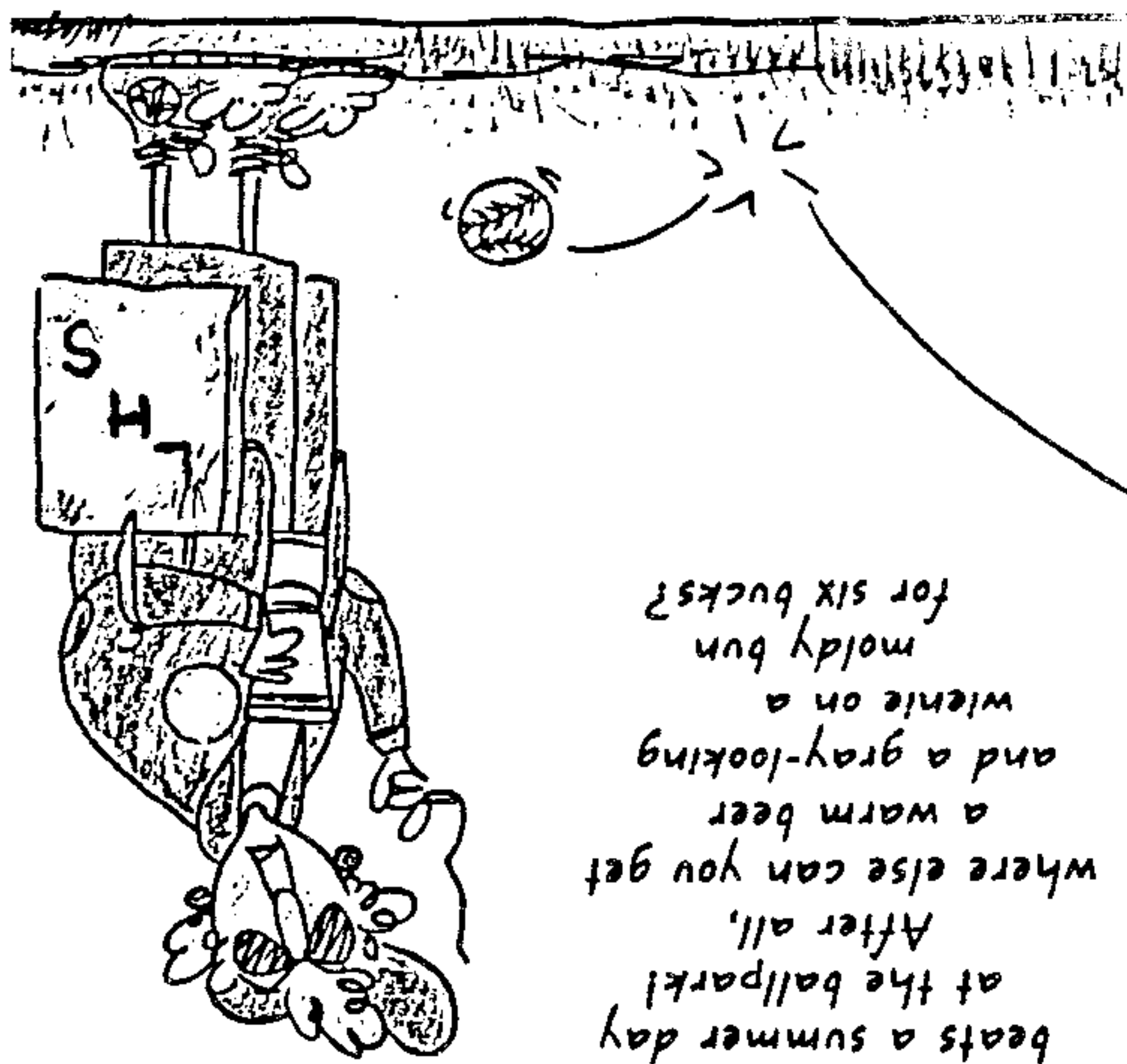

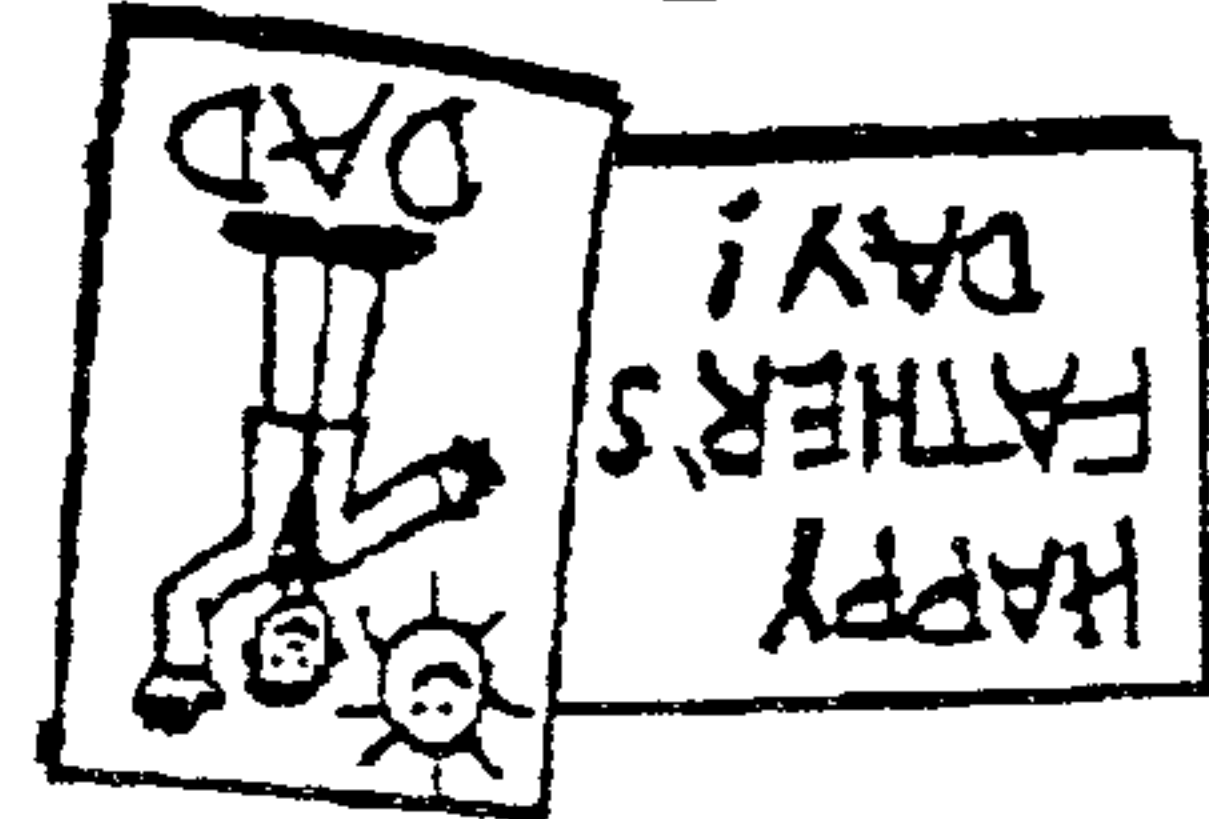
