The post office in Lakeside was shakin', rattlin' and rollin' Wednesday to celebrate the first-day issue of stamps which honor American Legends of rhythm 'n' blues and rock 'n' roll.

The stamps went on sale nationwide that day and Lakeside post office really got into the swing of things.

Postmistress CHLOE ADDISON, who has been stationed in Lakeside since February, admitted she took a chance taking this big of a step to celebrate the stamps' appearance on the postal scene.

"I wanted to do something fun," she said.

ADDISON lamented that with all the bad publicity the post office has had this year, she wanted to change that image.

"We're no different from any other industry," she said. "We have real people with feelings and aspirations, and we like to have fun."

She has an open door policy so people can get to know the post office and its employees, and feel comfortable, able to "tell us what they need and want us to do," she said.

JUNE 5th - "I LOVE A CLEAN LAKESIDE"

The event was sponsored and manned by Chamber of Commerce volunteers. By noon, more than 200 trucks and cars, filled to the brim, had come through the gates of the NELSON & SLOAN yard. AUGUST 2nd - ALBERT EINSTEIN'S ATOMIC BOMB LETTER: ANNIVERSARY.

Albert Einstein, world-famous scientist, a refugee from Nazi Germany, wrote a letter to US President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Aug 2, 1939, first mentioning a possible "new phenomenon . . . chain reactions . . . vast amounts of power" and "the construction of bombs." "A single bomb of this type," he wrote, "carried by boat and exploded in a port, might very well destroy the whole port together with some of the surrounding territory." An historic letter that marked the beginning of atomic weaponry. Six years and four days later, Aug 6, 1945, the Japanese port of Hiroshima was destroyed by the first atomic bombing of a populated place.
