We have started plans for the dedication, so mark September 11 - 10:00 a.m. to be sure and be here!

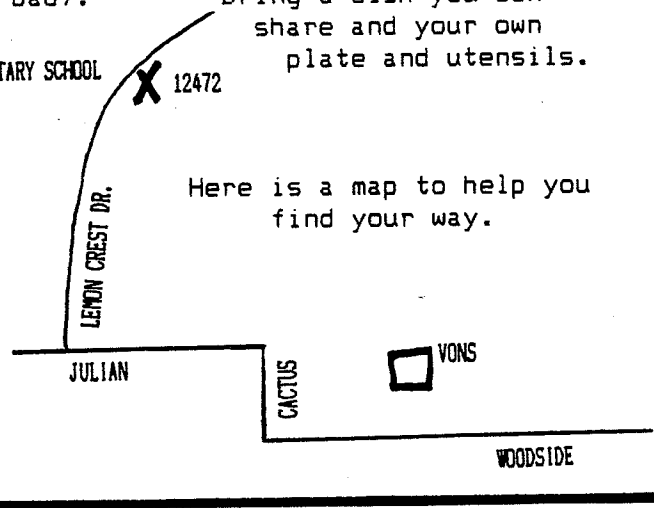


MAY 23rd - 1:00 P.M.

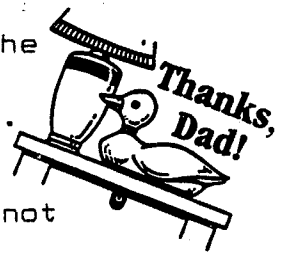

It was proclaimed for that date by the mayor of Spokane and recognized by the governor of Washington. The idea was publicly supported by President Calvin Coolidge in 1924, but not presidentially proclaimed until 1966.

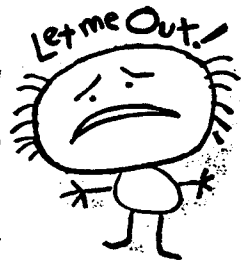
ACHES & PAINS

MARCELLA WILLIAMS had knee replacement. Has therapy machine at home and works out as instructed inspite of the discomfort. (Confined to house)

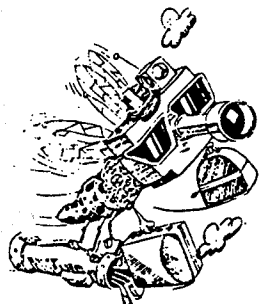
SHIRLEY ANDERSON was hospitalized for heart ailment - but never never stopping mentally or physically working on our Newsletter. (Confined to house)

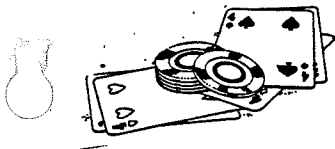


TRAVEL BUG

In Memoriam

REX HERLEY HUFFMAN died at his home in El Cajon, California on April 6, 1993 at the age of 75. A memorial service was held April 10, 1993 at El Cajon Elks Lodge #1812 where he was a charter member.

Rex was born May 31, 1917 in San Diego but his family moved to Lakeside when he was very small and he attended the Lakeside Grammar School. He and his brother helped their father build the barn that still stands on what is now the Pillsbury Ranch and they had vegetable gardens on approximately five acres across the street for several years.

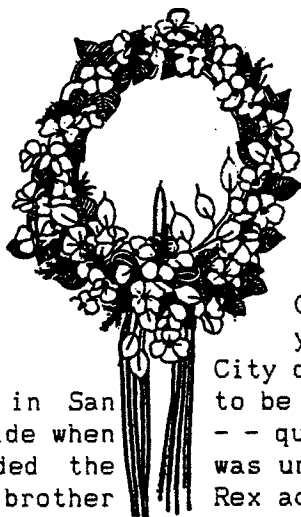
In 1927 after the flood waters receded in Lakeside they sold their property and moved to El Cajon where Rex attended El Cajon Grammar School and then graduated from Grossmont High School in 1937 where he was on the varsity football team 4 years.

After graduation he was employed for two years at Edgemoor in Santee - then called the County Farm - where he worked at night with the patients - his husky build helped him handle any difficult problems with the patients.

During the 1935 Exposition in Balboa Park he worked giving people rides in a rickshaw and he often spoke of two special passengers. One was ex-president Herbert Hoover and he was given a \$7.00 tip by movie actor Boris Karloff for getting him from one area in 7 minutes down to the Old Globe Theatre where he was performing. That was a really big tip for those days!

Rex later worked for his father-in-law hauling and delivering feed for Durban's Feed Store in El Cajon.

During this time he met Buss Ernest who was the local resident constable of the Santee area. Buss liked Rex and talked him into applying for a job as deputy sheriff. While waiting for this job Buss got Rex work as a "bouncer" at various night spots such as the Bostonia Ballroom, The Lakeside Hotel, Cecil's Bar in Lakeside, The Wagon Wheel in Santee and even on the Indian



reservations. Here again, his husky build was an asset. He was finally called to report to the sheriff's office and he worked in San Diego County jail for approximately two years before he was contacted by the City of El Cajon and asked if he would like to be the first Chief of Police of El Cajon - - quite an honor! Up until then, El Cajon was under the jurisdiction of a constable. Rex accepted the offer in the early 1940's and worked alone as a one-man police department for one year when he was finally able to convince the city fathers that he needed help and they hired Andy McReynolds as their first patrolman in 1943. Several other local El Cajon men were hired as patrolmen in about 6 months.

Rex classmates and played football together at Grossmont and their friendship remained strong all through the years. Andy visited Rex constantly during his long illness, taking him for drives and out for lunch as long as Rex was able to leave his home. Andy was indeed a true and devoted friend to Rex.

Rex retired as police chief in approximately 1948 and then worked for 20 years as a truck driver delivering oil for El Capitan Oil Company of Lakeside. He drove to all the back country, Jamul, Campo, Jacumba, Lagunas, Julian, Cuyamaca, Ramona, Pine Valley, Descanso and Alpine. When he retired from the oil company - he was given a new pickup truck.

Rex and his officers were responsible for re-routing and directing traffic in El Cajon for the first three Mother Goose Parades when they were held at night.

Rex was a life member of the El Cajon and Lakeside Historical Societies and a charter member of the El Cajon Elks Lodge #1812.

Rex will be missed by his former classmates, many friends and his family. Survivors include his two daughters, Linda Brooks of El Cajon and Yvonne Jones of La Quinta, CA; his brother Col. Orland Huffman of Parr, Texas; eight grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren; one niece and one nephew.

23 POT LUCK ANNUAL PICNIC - 1:00 p.m. - home of PAT ELLWOOD.
30 MEMORIAL DAY (Traditional) - This day honors the tradition of making memorial tributes to the dead, especially remembering those who have died in battle. Observed as a legal public holiday on the last Monday in May.
31 MEMORIAL DAY - Legal public holiday - Last Monday in May. Also known as DECORATION DAY. Most countries designate a day each year for decorating graves with flowers and for other memorial tributes to the dead. Especially an occasion for honoring those who have died in battle. (Observance dates from Civil War years in US: first documented observance at Waterloo, NY, May 5, 1865.)
31 CONFEDERATE MEMORIAL DAY - Virginia - Annually, the last Monday in May.
JUNE
14 FLAG DAY - On this day in 1777, John Adams introduced the following resolution before the Continental Congress, meeting at Philadelphia, PA: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States shall be thirteen stripes, alternate red & white; that the union be thirteen stars, white on a blue field, representing a new constellation." Presidential Proclamation each year - until finally Presidential Proclamation of May 30, 1916 to cover all succeeding years.
20 FATHER'S DAY - Presidential Proclamation issued for third Sunday in June in 1966 and annually since 1971.

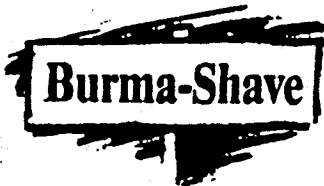
VOLUNTEERS.... through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. is very small) and right now 3 of those "dependables" are on a short disability leave.
