We are looking forward to the Christmas Home Tour, December 11th. Get your tickets now - \$8.00. Refreshments & entertainment - See you there!

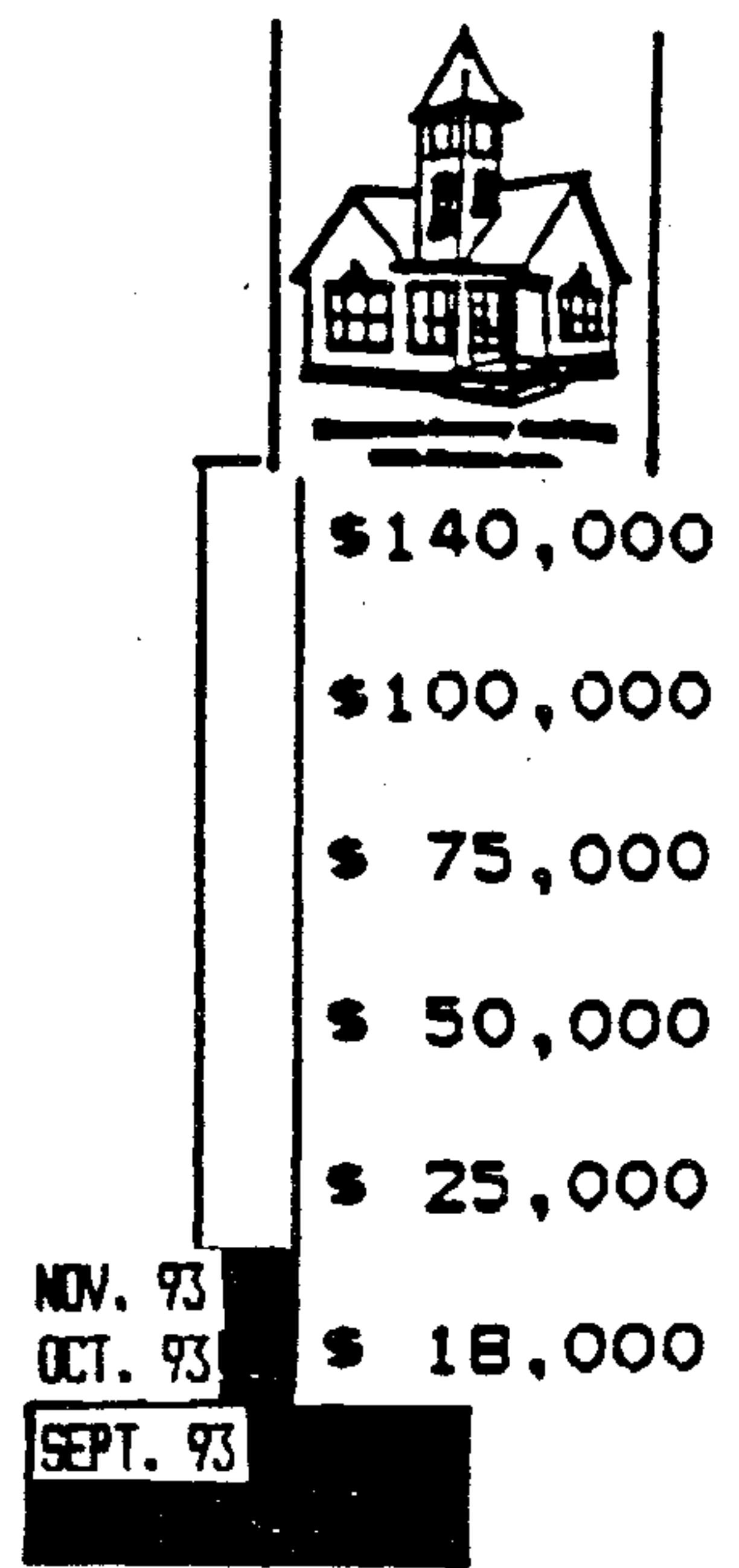

In Memoriam

BETTY McMILLEN in the loss of her father, Nov. 4, 1993. Lt. Comdr. Roy F. Creech, 82, of Lemon Grove. Survivors include a son, ROBERT CREECH & his wife MARY; daughter BETTY & husband ROD McMILLEN; 2 sisters, 5 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

BARBARA CONLEY in the loss of her mother, MYRTLE MAE GOODMAN, 89 of Lakeside died Saturday, November 6, 1993 at El Cajon Valley Convalescent Center. She was born MYRTLE MAE KANADY on November 6, 1904 in Alamogordo, New Mexico. Her family moved to Spring Valley when she was six. In 1913, her family relocated to Lakeside where she lived for 80 years until her death.

MYRTLE attended Lakeside Grammar School. The Lakeside Historical Society is currently trying to save this building as an historical landmark. She attended Riverview High School until the opening of Grossmont High School in 1922.

Her hobbies included camping, entertaining friends, sharing love with her family, and being a grandmother to everybody.

She belonged to a local group of women calling themselves TNT (Thimble, Needle, Thread). Their activities included mending, making, and creating for the needy.

During her lifetime, she worked as a local telephone operator, an assembly worker at Convair during WW II, and then a letter carrier for the Lakeside Post Office.

Along with caring for 43 foster children over a ten year period, she managed to raise her own family; daughter BARBARA MAE GOODMAN CONLEY and son STANFORD GOODMAN.

MRS. GOODMAN was preceded in death by her husband of 59 years, HARVEY J. GOODMAN (1980), and her son STAN GOODMAN (1989).

Survivors include daughter BARBARA CONLEY, 5 grandchildren, 12 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-great-grandchild, all East County residents. Many nieces, nephews, and relatives will miss GRANDMA MYRTLE.

OUR 1st GOLF TOURNAMENT

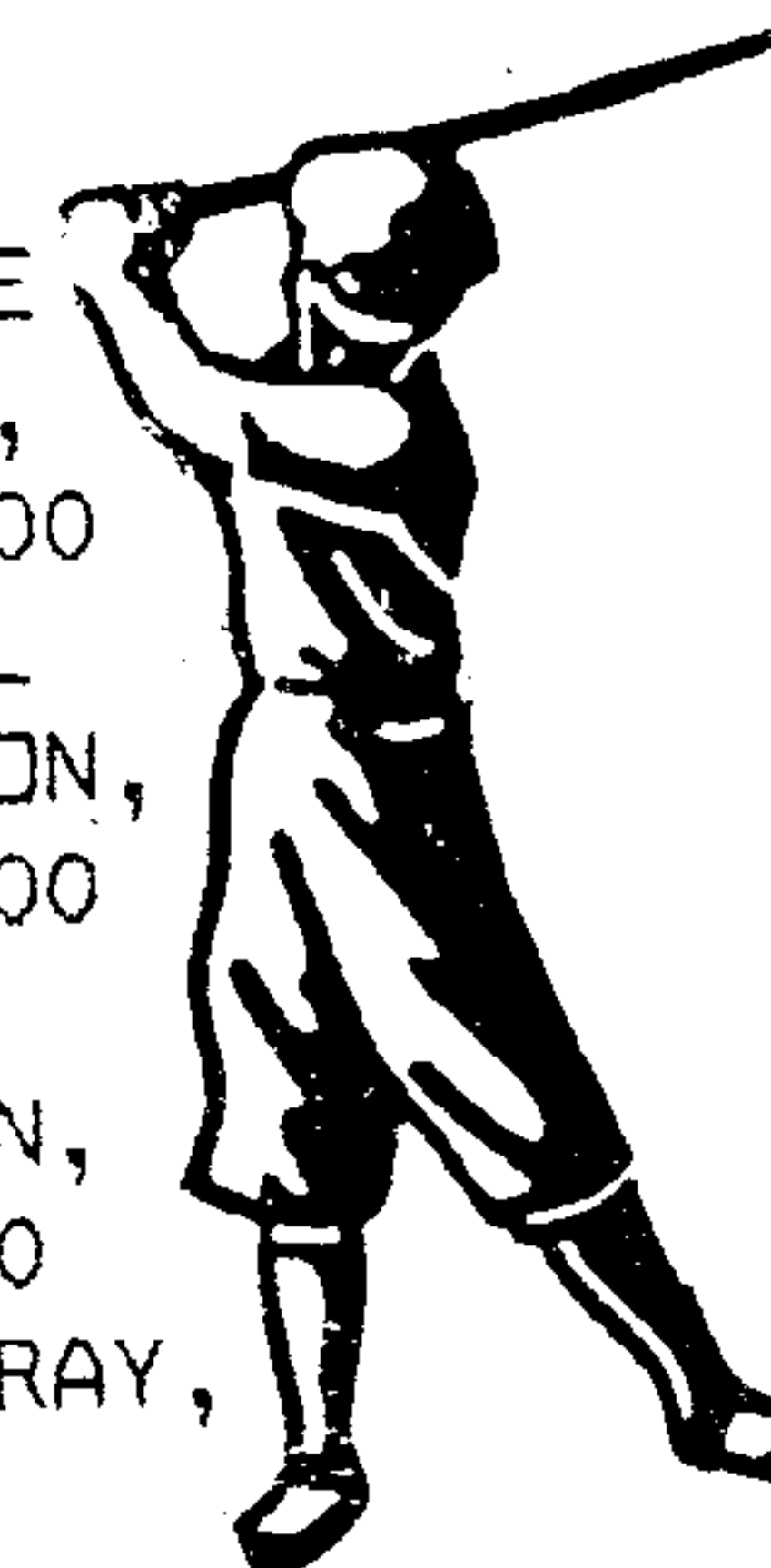

Special guest speakers included DIANNE JACOB, the President of California Garden Clubs, JOAN GOULD, and NANCY COTTINHAM, President of the Palomar District Garden Clubs. Former pastor of the historic church, Reverend Theodore Roberts gave the invocation.

Lakeside native, ESTELLA SUMMERVILLE, presented an antique memorial plaque, which had belonged to her Grandmother.

The release of butterflies and ladybugs and the ringing of the church bell highlighted the dedication.

According to historian, MARCELLA WILLIAMS, the Garden Club was founded by LUCY MAE CARRENDER IN 1960. She wanted to make Lakeside more beautiful.

In 1961 the club began entering competitions at the Del Mar Fair. They won many awards over the years.

Since they could not decide what to do with the prize money, they kept it in the bank for many years while searching for a worthwhile community service project.

Meanwhile they assisted in landscaping projects at the Education Center and at Lindo Park School.

When the Historical Society was pondering what to do about their front yard the Garden Club stepped in to offer their assistance.
