The "GRAYSON" name first appeared in Lakeside nearly 40 years ago when RAY GRAYSON SR. purchased the building at the corner of Lakeshore & Maine and opened GRAYSON MUSIC which offered a variety of musical instruments, accessories and of course, lessons - namely piano and guitar.



RAY GRAYSON SR. remained at this same location for approximately 12 years becoming a household name for music in Lakeside. RAY became quite active in the community, serving as President of the Chamber for two terms, and later writing his controversial but beloved articles "WITS & PIECES" for the Lakeside Trader.

After going into retirement briefly, his love of music and seeing the great need for it in Lakeside brought him back. He opened at various locations in Lakeside until 1986 when he returned to his original corner at Lakeshore & Maine (10001 Maine Ave.) where his son RAY GRAYSON JR & wife FRAN were and still are operating "GRAYSON PIANO CO."



Mr. RAY GRAYSON SR. can still be found at 10001 Maine Ave. at various times during the week and on Saturday mornings teaching. His love of music and the admiration and respect of his students - - past & present is un-ending.

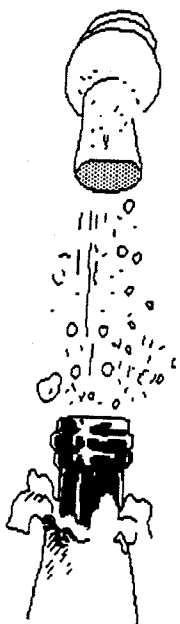

In Memoriam



FRED C. PRINDLE - 78

FREDDIE died Oct. 14, 1994 at his home in Lakeside. His Lakeside roots to back to 1914 when his grandparents bought acreage in Lakeside Farms. FREDDIE was born in San Diego in 1916 and in 1919 the family moved permanently to Lakeside. In 1924 the ranch was sold to BERNARD MANISCALCO who started his cactus farm at that time. FREDDIE attended local schools and worked with his father at his meat market located in Barker's grocery store on Maine St. He was involved in all aspects of Lakeside's community until his death. His knowledge and his willingness to share it was a big asset for our research department at the Historical Society. He was preceded in death by his wife, ILENE.

His survivors include two daughters: JANET TRUMP of San Diego and LEANNE MARKLE of Lakeside; one sister, SIS MAJOR of Lemon Grove.

VERGIL SHERRILL - 79

VERGIL died Oct. 18, 1994. It was he who converted the home of DR. CARLILE on Maine St., into Lakeside's first Funeral Chapel. He retired in 1980 but continued his association with the Mortuary until recently. VERGIL was active in many civic and service organizations and was a part president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Survivors include his wife, MARY; daughters, KATHRYN SHERRILL of Pasadena, LYNN BRADLEY of La Crescenta; a step-daughter, GRACE deVRIES of Lemon Grove.

DOYLE S. KNIPP - 79

DOYLE died at his home Oct. 21, 1994 in Tygh Valley, Oregon. DOYLE was born, graduated from high school, joined the Navy and married EVELYN MARIE THOMPSON in Napoleon, Ohio. After his Navy career they settled in Lakeside where DOYLE worked as a gardener for San Diego City School District. He was 1962-63 Post Commander of the VFW. After retirement they moved to Oregon where he started the Tygh Valley V.F.W.

He is survived by his wife EVELYN, daughter LINDA CASTLEMAN of Lakeside; son, REX KNIPP of Tygh Valley; three granddaughters, WENDY INCIONG, MONIQUE SWITZER and SONJA BURNS all of Lakeside; grandson, ZACHARIAH KNIPP of Tygh Valley; six great grandchildren and his sister, LOIS SITES of Napoleon,

CHARLIE BROWN

CHARLIE came to Lakeside in 1918 with his parents B.R. & PEARL BROWN. He graduated from Lakeside Grammar School and Grossmont High School and attended Davis University for two years. He returned to his parents home where he helped his father raise chickens on the "Triangle Chicken Ranch" in Lakeside Farms. CHARLIE worked for La Mesa Hatchery for several years and then opened his own hatchery in the basement of his home adjoining his parents. In the early 1960's he moved to northern California, first to Crescent Mills and on to Randle; where 1944 is known as the Year of the Banana Squash. CHARLIE harvested a 39-inch long banana squash weighing in at 70 pounds.

CHARLIE will be remembered by his many friends in Lakeside.



WYATT HALL IV - 47

WYATT was born Sept. 22, 1947 in Texas and lived in Lakeside from 1952 to 1972, graduating from El Capitan High School in 1965. In 1968 he was Student Body President of Grossmont Collage and a graduate of the University of San Diego in 1971. He was president of Meridian Title Co. in Illinois.

"A.G.O." stands for American Guild of Organists, a national professional organization with over 20,000 members most of whom are church organists. The idea of an Organ "Crawl" (name derived from times when visitors did indeed "crawl" into the chambers of pipe organs) came about because of a need to change the annual September meeting format. For some 15 years, Lakeside resident ANN GOODMAN (an AGO member & LHS member) hosted a potluck dinner/meeting at her Ha Hana Rd. home every September. In 1970 or so, it was quite an adventure for members, most of whom lived in or close to San Diego to travel "way out" to Lakeside for this social event. But as with all good things, new members join with different interests and the crowds at GOODMAN's grew smaller each year. There was also the matter of the occasional 100-plus degree September day. . .uncomfortable for an outdoor dinner.

GEORGE BUTTERFIELD became Program Chairman. He conceived the idea of a charter-but tour of pipe organs throughout the county which were not usually heard in public concerts and figured everyone would have a good time and be in a cooler environment - - particularly when churches had air conditioning.

The First Organ Crawl was to include no less than SIX churches stretching from University City throught La Mesa, El Cajon, Lakeside and the College area and required the timing of a railroad because they were to complete the tour in 5 hours. . .3 hours for listening and 2 hours for driving.
