MERTON A. THOMAS, 87

MERTON AND NELLIE THOMAS CAME TO LAKESIDE IN 1939 AND STARTED AN AUTOMOTIVE BUSINESS ON HWY 67 WHERE TODAY HIS SON DAVID HAS THE A & B LAWNMOWER SERVICE. HE ALSO WORKED AT CONVAIR AND GENERAL DYNAMICS FOR 30 YEARS. HE SPENT HIS LIFE IN COMMUNITY SERVICE AND DEVOTION TO HIS CHURCH. HE DIED AFTER A LENGTHY ILLNESS ON AUG. 2ND AND SERVICES WERE HELD AT FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF THE WILLOWS IN ALPINE ON AUG. 4TH WHICH WOULD HAVE BEEN THEIR 60TH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY.

HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE PACIFIC RAILWAY MUSEUM, REPUBLICAN-NATIONAL COMMITTEE AND LIFE MEMBER #72 OF THE LAKESIDE HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

SURVIVORS BESIDES HIS WIFE, NELLIE, INCLUDE DAUGHTERS, RUTH VEAL OF SACRAMENTO AND ESTHER OF LAKESIDE; SONS, MERTON, JR. OF PINE VALLEY AND DAVID OF LAKESIDE. SEVEN GRANDCHILDREN AND SEVEN GREAT-GRANDCHILDREN. ONE SISTER, WANDA BEESON OF KANSAS.

JACK MCLEAN, SR. 87

JACK WAS BORN SEPT. 19, 1912 IN CANADA AND DIED IN AUG. 1999 IN THOUSAND OAKS, CA, WHERE THEY HAD RESIDED FOR SEVERAL YEARS. HE AND HIS WIFE, MAZELL WERE MARRIED IN 1933. THEY LIVED AND WORKED ON THE PHEASANT FARM AND THE CHINCHILLA RANCH ON THE EAST END OF JULIAN AVE., FROM 1943 UNTIL 1958. THEY WERE MEMBERS OF THE LAKESIDE HISTORICAL SOCIETY. SURVIVORS INCLUDE A DAUGHTER, LINDA MCGUE OF THOUSAND OAKS AND A SON, JACK JR. OF OREGON, AND FIVE GRANDCHILDREN.

“Did You Know....” By Chris Herzog

A pioneer horticulturist, Kate O. Sessions was the first woman to receive a science degree from the University of California at Berkeley. Following her arrival in San Diego in 1884, she taught briefly at Russ High School (San Diego High School today). Sessions' love for the study of plants soon led her to abandon teaching and open a nursery and flower stand in Coronado in 1887. One of Sessions' landscape projects was to provide plant material for the great interior courtyard of the newly constructed Hotel del Coronado. San Diego's fine climate provided the means to experiment with some tropical varieties so, in this courtyard, she introduced the first Birds of Paradise to be planted outside a conservatory. Some of these still flourish on the hotel grounds today.

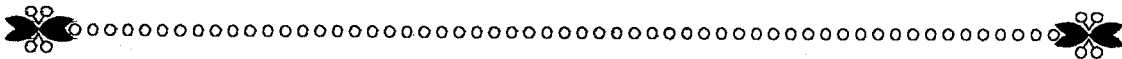
In the early 1890's, Sessions leased land in San Diego's City Park (Balboa Park today). In return, she agreed to plant 100 trees each year in the park and donate 300 more for general city beautification, some of which survive to this day. Many of these specimens, including rare cork trees, acacias, palms and camphor trees, were the first of their kind to be planted in North America. Sessions' contributions to the park earned her the nickname "Mother of Balboa Park". In later years, she continued to introduce new plant species such as the Twisted Juniper and Red Bougainvillea into the San Diego area.

In 1939, Sessions was honored by the American Genetic Association of Washington D.C., with the Frank N. Meyer Medal for her distinguished contributions in flower and plant introduction. This recognition not only acknowledged Sessions' many "firsts" in the field of horticulture, but was the first such honor ever awarded to a woman.

Kate Sessions' influence can be seen here in Lakeside at the Klein Ranch (more popularly known as The Lemon Crest Ranch) located on Single Oak Dr. Built in 1886 on 50 acres planted to be a lemon orchard, approximately 10 acres surrounding the house were reserved for the family gardens and were landscaped by Kate Sessions, who at that time was a promising young landscape architect, and well known to the famous designer, Irving Gill, who designed this home.

At the site of the Kate O. Sessions Nursery, the plaque commemorates the life and influence of a woman who envisioned San Diego as beautiful, when at that time, was practically tree-less. On this site she operated a nursery and gained world renown as a horticulturist. Located at Pico and Balboa, San Diego, Landmark #764.

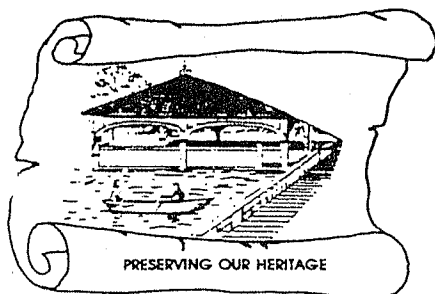


THEATRE PARTY

PRESERVATION OF LAKESIDE'S OLDEST BUILDING

The Old Ferry Ranch, located on Palm Row, was built in 1875. Recently, the 22 acre ranch was sold to Palmtag Development. They want to build 42 houses on small lots. The old house will be sandwiched between other tract homes. We feel that this old home deserves better. Since it is so important to the character of the community, it should be on at least one acre.

There doesn't seem to be any plan to preserve the palm trees for which the area was named.

A few months ago, we gathered over 300 signatures asking for the preservation of the house and that the new development have one acre or one-half acre lots so they would blend in with the surrounding horse ranches. (unfortunately we are losing our small ranches in Lakeside).

The county archeologist, who is studying the impact of this development on our community, wants to hear from Lakeside citizens. This is our big chance to make a difference on how this development will proceed.

Please write a letter about the loss of the ranches and palm trees, preservation of the historic house, community character and anything else you consider important to the preservation of our rural heritage.

It had gotten to be a chore to find one of us available each day to pick up the mail. This saves all that effort and saves \$\$\$\$\$ too !

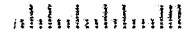
