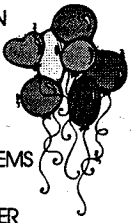

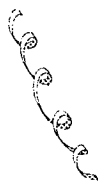

Plaque's Update

Almost a year ago the Board of the Historical Society mad eithe decision to locate and mark Lakeside's old buildings. That's quite a process. It involves driving around the area, finding a candidate building, doing the research, and finally ordering the plaque.

So far three buildings have been selected and plaqued. The first was the Ferry Ranch, which was being threatened by the bulldozer. The second was the old Church on Maine and Parkside, which was completed in 1896, and is the home of the Lakeside Historical Society.

The last is the house on the corner of Channel and Julian, which was designed by the noted Architect Irving Gill, is another underway now.

In the building which houses the Golden Goose, it was home to the Woman's Club for many years. In fact, todays Woman's Club is donating the cost of the plaque.

In working now on the Boathouse in the park, that was built in 1886. We have more older buidlings than you think! - Pat Ellwood

WHITAKER "HILLTOP" HOME

WHITAKER, HALE & MILDRED

Hale purchased a hilltop from W.E. Oaks, and they built a house from native moss-faced stones on the hill, affording protection against the chill winds of winter and a barrier against the heat of summer. The site for the home was selected carefully. Hale cautiously bulldozed the long private road and a level area without disturbing the contour of the hill. The interior of the house combined comfort and beauty in a floor plan designed by Hale and Mildred. The focal point of the living room is an immense fireplace also made of stones, some of which

came from Death Valley. It has a unique raised hearth. Construction was not a hasty thing. From its start in 1935 until its completion in July 1940, every step was carefully planned and supervised and many of the less technical jobs Hale and Mildred did themselves. Mildred dipped shingles in creosote and laid them in position on the roof and Hale followed with hammer and nails. Their teamwork also resulted in the beautiful laid hardwood floors throughout the house.

The southwest bedroom became the personal apartment for Mildred's mother, who made her home with them until her death in 1955.

Landscaping has been done with a constant consideration for the natural look and every effort has been made to preserve the unobstructed view. The Hilltop home is surrounded by trees, shrubs and flowers, each one planted lovingly by the Whitakers. Directly in front of the house are two *Pyracantha Formosa* trees. These in season are smothered with enormous clusters of bright crimson berries. The spectacular night blooming *Cereus Peruvianus Monstrosus* from South Africa planted in 1940 when it was a foot high, now stands more than 15 feet and bears more than 1000 blooms in the summer. Over the years a dozen cuttings from the mother plant have been planted around the hill - some now larger than the mother. The Hilltop's *Gardenia* and *Camelia* blossoms have graced many homes, businesses and meetings in Lakeside over the years.

MILDRED AND HALE'S LAST PICTURE TOGETHER

Hale was a heavy equipment operator with San Diego County Engineering Department who started when horse-drawn equipment was used to build roads. He drove the County's first motor-grader, and stayed with the County Road Department for 47 years, only taking time out from 1942-1945 to serve as a Navy Seabee in the South Pacific. He sent frequent packages home. Among the souvenirs were baskets, vases, ocean shells, samples of jungle hardwood and innumerable other articles. During his absence, Mildred kept the home place running smoothly, keeping the steep driveway in passable

Hale, born in Leroy, Illinois, had lived in Lakeside since he was 3 years old.

Mildred, born in Wisconsin, educated to be an executive secretary, came west, worked in San Francisco and did publicity work at a Hollywood Studio before coming to San Diego with her mother in 1931. She worked for the San Diego Harbor Department, was in charge of purchasing and edited, arranged and published the 'Port of San Diego', a pictorial record of San Diego Port industries and activities, from 1932 through 1940. Mildred and Hale met at a party (that neither had wanted to attend) given by mutual friends in Lakeside on October 7, 1933, a meeting followed by courtship and marriage January 1, 1939.

Mildred never expected to see Hale again, but he telephoned for a date the following Saturday, October 14, 1933. After dinner and some dancing, they drove to the waterfront and parked on Broadway Pier for a look at the Bay by moonlight. A few minutes later they heard a car drive on the Pier I, some distance away. Someone got out of the car and threw something in the Bay that made a loud splash. Probably someone getting rid of garbage, they thought. The car left the Pier I and Hale and Mildred drove home. The next morning, Sunday October 15th, the San Diego Union put out an Xtra with big black headlines - 'Murdered Woman's Body Found Floating in Bay' - Horribly Hacked - Sewed in Seabag, etc., etc. Unidentified 60 year old woman.' Two bags were found by boat crews off Broadway Pier and Pier I.

Mildred mailed the front page of the Union to Hale - with comments. She found it again after his death in 1980 with her letters to Hale which he had saved during the years. An unforgettable first date!

One of their following dates was spent at the Rodeo Grounds riding the big Sprinkler. Hale was a member of the Rodeo Association Board and he took the job of keeping the ground wet for the next day's Rodeo.

Such was the beginning of the sharing of 47 years until Hale's passing July 1, 1980.

PRESERVATION OF LAKESIDE'S OLDEST BUILDING

The old Ferry Ranch, located on Palm Row, was built in 1875. Recently, the 22 acre ranch was sold to Palmtag Development. They want to build 41 houses on small lots. The old house, will be sandwiched between other track homes. I feel that this old home deserves better. Since it is so important to the character of the community, it should be on at least one acre.

There doesn't seem to be any plan to preserve the palm trees for which the area was named.

A few months ago we had gathered over 300 signatures asking for the preservation of the house and that the new development have one acre or 1/2 acre lots so they would blend in with the surrounding horse ranches.

(Unfortunately we are loosing our small ranches in Lakeside).

The County Archeologist, who is studing the impact of this development on our community, wants to hear from the Lakeside Historical Society members. This is our big chance to make a difference in how this development will proceed.

Please write a letter about the loss of the ranches and palm trees, preservation, preservation of the historic house, community character and anything else you consider important to the preservation of our rural heritage. We need your help!

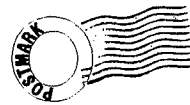

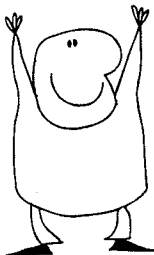

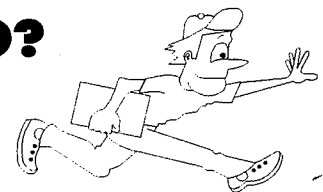
