

FROM THE ARCHIVES: SCANNING HISTORY

As you may know, LHS has a pretty impressive collection of historical photographs from Lakeside's past. Archives volunteer Grace Parrott has been diligently backing up those photos over the years by scanning each one and storing them on a separate drive. The project is ongoing as we add more photos to the collection.

One of the problems we have is that many of our photos are too big for the standard scanner. Case in point:

In 1978, the George Miller family donated a spectacular four-foot long print of a circa 1918 panoramic view of Lakeside (above). Taken from Whitaker Hill, the photograph is one of the most valuable items we have (in terms of historical perspective). You may have seen it—it's been hanging up in the Gift Shop for many years now. It is definitely one-of-a-kind. Unfortunately, it's way to large to scan with our tools, so we took it to our friends at Giant Photo Services on El Cajon Boulevard. They have the tools and technique for such a project—and they did not disappoint. We now have a high resolution scan of this wonderful photo and, in addition, the ability to crop and enlarge with incredible clarity. Take a look at the photo below—cropped from the new scan—and see Lakeside like you've never seen it before. This particular view shows the rear (east side) of the Lakeside Inn, including the old dairy barn, the raceway (which at this point hadn't been used in six or seven years), and so much more. Look closer and you will see the Olde Community Church, the Manse next door, and even the Lindo Hotel (now the Lakeside Hotel) and the Hotel Zeno. This is what makes preservation so fun and exciting. It's like traveling back in time, to be able to see things as they were.

While we no longer make prints of our photos, we will sell you a scanned copy for a minimal fee and you can have them printed out yourself. Check in with us to find out how and the rules on how to do it (we do not sell our photos online).



Living History Days is coming up in June! We'll be looking for volunteers to setup up on June 3 and volunteers to staff our history stations on June 4 through 6. It's always a lot of fun!
