ANOTHER 100-YEAR ANNIVERSARY IN LAKESIDE



From the San Diego Union, March 9, 1924: "Within the last year work has started on a new, modern block facing the main highway that bisects Lakeside, which, when completed, will represent an investment of more than \$30,000. The building will be of fireproof construction and will be occupied by a drug store and the J.B. Rumsey department store. It is expected the structure will be completed within the next few weeks."

The building of which the article speaks is still standing. The Leo's Pharmacy building is now 100 years old—and still serving the community today. It was originally designed to have a second floor, but those plans were seemingly abandoned.

The very poor photograph (above) illustrates the state of the building in March 1924 (sorry—we looked high and low for an actual print, but it appears to be lost; this is a scan from the newspaper—you can still see the basic shape of the structure in its original form). It is interesting to note that plans for the building included a drug store.

The "modern" building was part of an effort by the Lakeside Land and Improvement Company to aid with increasing the town's population and general prosperity. A number of businesses have occupied the premises over the years, including

Otto Marcks' groceries, Cecil's Café (before it moved to Woodside Avenue), and various paint, hardware, and appliance shops. Leo Ward leased it in 1965 and eventually bought the building. The current owner is Raj Zalavadiya, who has continued the pharmaceutical tradition as it remains known as Leo's Pharmacy today (at right).




