#### CO-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Stacy Hensle

Summer is moving along; soon we will march into Fall. LHS hosted our 3rd graders for Living History Days this past June. We had students from Lakeview, Lindo Park, Lemon Crest, Lakeside Farms, and the Montessori Preschool. The weather was picture perfect. We couldn't have asked for any better.

First, I want to thank the many volunteers we had for this event. Without all of you, this could not have happened. Thank you! Thank you!

Kudos to all those who set up the event on Monday. Thank you to George Krisnowich, Roland Rhodes, and all the others who helped with the "easy ups" and all the stations. Many of the volunteers who were there for setup also worked the various stations.

On Tuesday, June 3, we hosted Lakeview Elementary. They had 125 students and it was a very busy day. The kids were great and they had a great time.

On Wednesday, June 4, we had Lindo Park with 70 students. The teachers say this is their students' favorite field trip of the year. After that, we had the Pre-K students from Montessori school, across the street. Those students even did the "button on the string" game. It was so fun to watch them. They were so cute as they participated.

On Thursday, June 5, we had two schools: Lemon Crest with 70 students and Lakeside Farms with 108. They all had a great time, but at the end of the day we were all tired. Whew!

The students were able to participate at 10 different stations, which included washing clothes using washboards and wringers, learning about old farm equipment to grind corn (which the kids loved to do) and making ropes (staged by the Early Day Gas Engines Tractor Association). There were "hands-on" experiences like milking a (trainer) cow, sewing on a button, and seeing loom weaving, knitting and crocheting in action. They also learned how to make and play with the "button on a string" game. This year we set up a games table so the students could play old-fashioned games like jacks and pickup sticks.

The kids attended our olde-time schoolhouse, doing math on a slate board, and someone may have earned the dunce cap. They also learned how to braid. And we had

#### LIONEL'S LEGACY IN HISTORIC ROCK HOUSE

It's always great to see one of our historic buildings being restored and effectively reused. The old Kanady rock house on Woodside Avenue was built in 1937 is now home to a new business: Lionel's Legacy Senior Dog Rescue.

This great little nonprofit hit the ground running. They have really gotten involved with Lakeside, attending Chamber events, hosting a monthly senior dog walk at Lindo Lake, and joining LHS! And the Chamber recently recognized them with a Community Leadership Award!

Founder Laura Oliver and Chamille Lamb are the Directors of Operations. Their motto is, "Creating a legacy of COMPASSION, ADVOCACY, and EDUCATION through saving senior dogs." They do not have any dogs on site; their senor dogs are fostered out. Check their website for photos of senor dogs for adoption and/or fostering (lionelslegacy.org).

Lionel's also offers many resources for senior dogs, including discounted medical/dental attention and doggie supplies (leashes, collars, etc.). They are thrilled to be in Lakeside and in a historic home - and we are happy that they are now a part of our community. Welcome to Lakeside, Lionel's Legacy!

LOCAL HISTORIC BUILDINGS FOR SALE

A number of our historic buildings have suddenly come up for sale, which is always a bit concerning. Will the new owners want to maintain or destroy these old places? We can hope they would be interested in maintaining the delicate historic fabric of our little town, but that is very often not the case. Unfortunately, our standing history is very vulnerable.

A few years back, one of our oldest homes on River Drive (built in 1895!) was unceremoniously scraped from existence by a neighboring business, with no consideration for its legacy or significance. One can argue that an owner should be able to do what they wish with a property, but should there not be a duty to the community and its presence and history?

Now two more historic buildings are up for sale: the old Tumbleweed Café and Bar on Maine Avenue built in 1934 (above left— many remember as a lawnmower repair shop) and the old Role Pie Crust, Inc. building, built in 1947 (above right—now residences) on Julian Avenue. Are they the most historic or valuable? Is it worth trying to save them? Of course, there are many reasons why a new owner might want to demolish and start over with a new build, but there are equally as many reasons to save a bit of history. Our historic downtown, with its many older buildings still serving a purpose, symbolizes our unique and proud history. Image a Western Day Parade or a Spirit of Christmas event among a bunch of box-cutter, non-descript warehouses—you just won't get the same feeling of pride. And while some folks don't think much of an old building, it is often worth going that extra bit more to save something for posterity. Let's hope the new owners "do the right thing." We invite them to stop by the Lakeside Historical Society and find out more about our history.
